An experienced sailor, his wife, and their two small children were 900 miles off the coast of Mexico, on a round-theworld adventure, when it all happened. Responding to a distress call, rescuers parachuted into the sea beside the craft to render aid; the family was then brought to safety aboard the USS Vandegrift. All this set the pundits to arguing about who should foot the bill for the rescue, given an alleged lack of good judgment on the part of the parents for embarking on such a journey with small children.
