

Determining Value

If someone would like a tax deduction for items donated to charity, the U.S. Internal Revenue Service demands that donors calculate the value of those items.

Organizations such as Goodwill Industries compile lists of estimated values of commonly donated goods. It is assumed that the listed items are in good condition.
